



Increase Members Signed Up for National Membership

Purpose: After a decrease in the national membership percentage last year, UF ASCE made it a priority to encourage members to sign up for a National ASCE membership in 2019.

Action Plan: Our secretary and office managers worked on streamlining the process to receive a national membership by encouraging all new members to create an account simultaneously to buying the Student Society membership. We also encouraged members to sign up for this by creating an extra discount in our merchandise office, allowing national members to save an additional 10% on purchases such as engineering paper and portfolios.

• End of 2018: 38%

• Goal by End of 2019: 50%

• End of 2019: 59.8%

• Result (%): 120%

The chapter excelled in achieving this goal through the various methods implemented.

For the Future: Moving into the next year, we hope to continue to register most of our new members into the National ASCE membership as they join our Student society. We strive to continue this trend in the following year.



Create the Inaugural UF ASCE Golf Tournament

Purpose: In order to encourage economic sustainability, our UF ASCE Chapter decided to innovate a new fundraising event, a golf tournament. Companies paid to play in the tournament where they played 18 holes at Haile Plantation Golf and Country Club while paired with some skilled UF ASCE members on their golf teams.

Action Plan: Led by the President and an advisor, the golf tournament planning continued over the course of months prior to November. It included reaching out to engineering companies to participate, local companies for gift cards, and ASCE members to volunteer throughout the event. Also, logistics and scheduling had to be coordinated for the day of.

- Goal by End of 2019: Fundraise approximately \$10,000; Involve 50 students
- End of 2019: \$12,650; 27 students (22 volunteers, 5 golfers)
 - Result (%): 126.5%; 54%

Without a previous benchmark, this event surpassed the initial plans of our organization in terms of financial benefit, although it did fall short in the number of people involved. This lack came purely from lack of jobs for people to run.

For the Future: The golf tournament is on track to become an annual event for UF ASCE. We plan to innovate based off of feedback from participants in the golf tournament and hopefully provide more opportunity for volunteers and professionals to network and socialize. We also hope to optimize the course order and prizes.



Recruit Students to Join as New Members

Purpose: As a chapter, UF ASCE strives to create a welcoming and supporting environment that fosters professional and social growth for its members. With this attitude, the chapter seeks out new members to continue these values.

Action Plan: To introduce what ASCE is to a variety of students in the department, the chapter tabled at university Involvement Fairs, presented the civil engineering portion of the Intro to Engineering course (EGS 1006), and posted flyers and promotional materials for upcoming events. These methods were chosen to improve targeted marketing and to interested students on campus.

- End of 2018: 79 New Members
- Goal by End of 2019: 75 New Members
- End of 2019: 52 New Members
 - Result (%): 69.3%

Based off of tracked membership, UF ASCE can search the number of members who register in a year. Although the chapter did not reach our targeted benchmark for new registered members in 2019, we did have over 50 members sign up to join the organization, most of which are younger students or transfer students.

For the Future: UF ASCE will focus on creating events targeted to help new members integrate into the organization by meeting other members early on. We will also work to improve our promotional materials and methods in reaching engineering students in the department.

After lunch, the group began the civil engineering challenge: to build a bridge over a theoretical river. The students were provided the basics necessary to complete the challenge of maneuvering a remote control car across the bridge safety.



Special Projects: Girl Scout Badge Day

Project Impact:

The students heard presentations catered to their age and level of education. We hope to open young people's eyes to their options of entering the STEM field in their future career. The hands-on activity engages the students to learn creativity thinking and problem solving skills. Additionally, for longevity, we aimed to provide a strong connection with local troops and students to create long term connections for future years.
